

Child Exploitation: Online Trends and Applications

This presentation will focus on current online trends related to the sexual exploitation of children. The presentation will include an overview of the Wisconsin Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force and focus on current applications and social media environments and methods being used to sexually exploit children online.

Got Grief? A Toolbox for Creating Permanency for Youth

This workshop will provide an overview of the Intensive Permanence Services model which integrates best practices in grief, loss, and trauma, and prepares youth for permanency while seeking, engaging, and developing caring adult connections. The Youth Connections Scale (evidence-based measurement tool) will also be introduced. Participants will increase awareness of skills needed to guide youth in developing emotional readiness for permanency; whether adoption, reunification, placement with a permanent support, etc. Participants will receive multiple tools/activities used to assist youth in resolving past losses and develop healthy and emotional connections.

Helping the Digital Generation Become Leaders

In a time when the average child spends more time daily in front of a screen than sleeping, and parents have to be pried away from their own devices, the culture has become increasingly less personal. Children cannot become proficient at skills they don't practice or see modeled. In order for youth to realize their full potential they need to develop healthy boundaries, tactful communication skills, conflict resolution skills and problem solving abilities. It is critical that children interact with the adults in their life with respect and that those adults model skills for the children they will need as they mature.

How to Forgive in an Unforgiving World

What is forgiveness? Why does it matter? Why is it so hard? We have all been hurt by someone. Sometimes those hurts turn into anger, stress, and depression. We try different ways to put it behind us, to forget about it, to get even, to dull the pain — but memories keep coming back and nothing seems to work. Have you tried forgiving — not just saying it, but doing it? We will learn how forgiveness should be considered an option — for you and those you are trying to help. Come learn the basics of forgiveness and how it fits into maintaining a healthy life.

How to Stop Chasing C.O.W.S (Crisis of the Week)

C.O.W(s) impact our work so greatly that we become used to this level of crisis intervention and believe this is just how it is in the Human Services field. There is another way that can help reduce chasing C.O.W(s) and let you work with clients proactively instead of reactively. This training will teach how to plan for crises and reduce the time spent chasing C.O.W(s).

The Invisible Population: Understanding Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning (LGBTQ) Youth Risk and Protective Factors

An overview of LGBTQ definitions, and terms to allow people to have a foundational understanding of acronyms, definitions, and terminology. Discussion on specific data that highlights risk behaviors and health outcomes to showcase disparities between LGBTQ youth and their non-LGBTQ identified peers. Discussion on ways to create safe and welcoming spaces for LGBTQ youth, protective factors, and ideas for specific advocacy efforts both individually and collectively.

Maximizing the Benefits of Risk/Need Assessments in Youth Justice: Importance of Implementation

This workshop will review the research support for using risk/need assessment, such as the YASI, in youth justice settings and explain why this is a preferred and evidence-based practice for case planning. This workshop will review best practice steps in the quality implementation of risk/needs assessment to maximize outcomes, such as decreasing formal processing, reducing costly out-of-home placements, avoiding referrals to services for youth who do not need services, and guiding case-planning to reduce chances of future delinquency and violence while still protecting public safety.

Rise Together: Understanding the Teenage Drug Epidemic & Youth Panel

Misuse and overuse of illicit and non-illicit drugs among adolescents has increased. The purpose of this review is to summarize some of the major differences that likely contribute to teenage substance misuse and disorders within urban and rural communities. In addition, we will review urban preventative approaches. Finally, we will highlight a novel approach of peer leadership through RISE TOGETHER, and how this approach may be uniquely positioned to address substance misuse and disorders among rural adolescents.

Sextortion: Sequel to Sexting

Sextortion is becoming a trend in the world of technology, and it is one that we can't ignore. Many times, sextortion starts somewhat "innocently" as a child or teen sending a risky image to someone they think they can trust, and then the trust is broken and the relationship changes to a threatening and violent one. This session will discuss components of sextortion cases, a local sextortion case that revealed hundreds of victims nationally and internationally, safety information to help lessen the risks, and reporting and investigative resources in case it happens.

#ShowMe5: 5 Restorative Justice Activities for Youth at Risk

An overview of what restorative justice entails and what it doesn't entail. Examples of 5 restorative justice activities for at risk youth will be provided.

Social Work Ethics & Boundaries

This presentation will cover topics related to ethics and boundaries within social work practice. We will discuss the ethical use of power within social work practice. We will explore the different types of power that we possess as professionals and the power of our clients.

Street Drugs and Current Trends

This presentation covers the wild and ever changing world of street drugs. A breakdown of street slang used, what the drugs are, how they are used, what the cause and effect are and how to identify both use and paraphernalia. At the end of the presentation I outline what currently is the biggest drug problem we face as far as "what's hot, what's not." I have handouts and display numerous items of street drugs and paraphernalia.

Testifying Tips for Intake Workers

Supporting documents will assist attendees in preparing for and providing testimony in court proceedings. Attendees will be exposed to common terminology used during court proceedings. This presentation will provide attendees with strategies for all stages of court testimony from preparation and direct testimony through cross examination and assessment of your performance as a witness. It will also address how to handle forgetfulness, exhibits, objections, danger zones and traps.

The Toxic Cloud: Empowering Children Living with Dysfunction

Many children who are served by human service systems and our schools reside in homes that are toxic and dysfunctional. That environment itself may contribute directly and indirectly to the problems of the child. In many cases, these families are resistive to intervention, support and assistance. This talk is designed to provide the participant an understanding of the resistive family system and how to empower children to survive and even thrive in those toxic environments.

Transforming Trauma: Judicial Perspective

This session will explore the child welfare to juvenile delinquency to adult prison pipeline that passes traumatized children from one system to the next.

What You Need to Know About Special Education

Learn an overview of special education requirements for student with disabilities, which will include information on how to refer, what is an Individualized Education Program and how it is developed, and what is meant by the Least Restrictive Environment.
